

# Found Object Color Wheel

## Lesson Plan #1- Grade 5

### OVERVIEW & PURPOSE

Hello 5th Grader! The Hingham Art Teachers have been working hard to give you fun and creative ways to review what you already know about visual art. We understand that different families have different resources at home (so do I!) so you will have choices. These next few days 5th grade students are working on color. ### OBJECTIVES

This week's art creation should be simple, quick, and hopefully fun, Since there are only 3 days left in this week, and you will have other tasks to accomplish. Art Review: COLOR! Grade five students will create a found object color wheel. This lesson is designed to review colors and explore color relationships.

1. Students will create a found object color wheel
2. Students will review the color wheel and observe color relationships
3. Students will recognize that some art is temporary

### MATERIALS NEEDED (two options)

Choice one:

Everyday household objects around the house: toys, pictures, tools, stuffed animals, packaged non perishable foods, etc

Choice two:

1. magazines
2. scissors

3. Glue
4. Optional: markers, colored pencils, or crayons, paper to draw on
5. Surface for collage: paper, used flat cardboard, an old unused book etc.

## INTRODUCTION

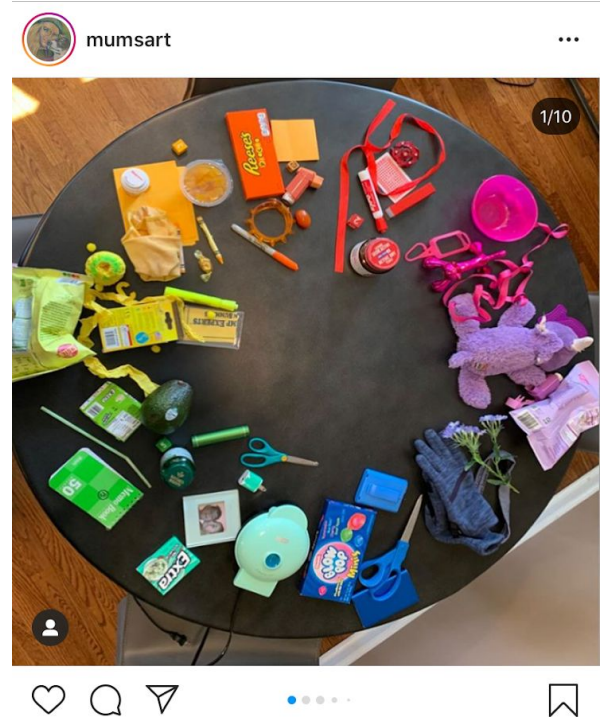
Begin by exploring color! Look at the color wheel above. What do you notice? What is your favorite color? What colors do you think look good together? Look around the room, what is an object that you see that is your favorite color?

Optional extension: Play I Spy! “I spy something that is blue/green” take turns looking for and identifying the object!

## ACTIVITY CHOICE 1

1. Using the color wheel, go on a scavenger hunt, find 3-5 objects of each color on the color wheel. They do not need to be all one color, it is ok if there are some objects with a little bit of another color on it.
2. Collect the objects in a central location, group them by what color they are. You may find that you have variations of each color, for example you might have light greens, dark greens, neon greens etc, this is GREAT!
3. Arrange the objects in correct color wheel order and take a picture like the one above! The video below will help you arrange your colors

4. Remember, some art is temporary! Don't forget to put back all the items in the places they were found!

## ACTIVITY CHOICE 2

- Using old magazines and/or empty and clean food packaging like cereal boxes, cut out different pictures that are the colors on a color wheel. You could even draw and color in a picture of something!

Note: You may find that you have variations of each color, for example you might have light greens, dark greens, neon greens etc, this is GREAT! You may also find that some cut outs have more than one color in it, this is fine! Group the cutting with the color it mostly is.



- Arrange the cut outs in a circle on paper, cardboard, or any other base you may have available! Make sure that they are in the correct places on the color wheel (make sure blue is between purple and green!)The video below will help you arrange your colors:
